### **Accreditation**

Although there is no requirement for you to enter your child for any tests or examinations, for secondary school aged children, you may wish to consider their need for qualifications, for example at GCSE, IGCSE or GNVQ part one. About half of sixteen-year-olds are expected to gain 5 or more GCSEs at A-C grades. If they do not get qualifications at 16, it is possible to complete an access course at college to
