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


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Ward profile



The West Carr Ward has a population of 12,650 people living in approximately 5,381 households.

West Carr has three district centres, Roebank, where there is a newly constructed convenience store and fast food outlet, Grandale with a larger collection of shops and take away food and the larger centre of Northpoint which is a very busy commercial shopping centre with a one of the best footfall profiles of comparative centres in the UK. The Bransholme Urgent Treatment Centre can also be found at the Northpoint complex.

Spread across the Ward are five primary schools St Andrews C of E, Sutton Park, Bude Park, St Mary Queen of Martyrs RC and Cleeve also on Dulverton Close there is Northcott Special School. There are two Community Centres, Alf Marshall located on Goodhart Road and St Andrews located on Ennerdale.

The ward also has one of the largest parks in Hull, Bude Park which is an ideal location for getting active and playing sports outdoors. Bude Park has its own outdoor gym for public use at any time, an extensive range of play equipment, plus a large number of sports pitches which are available for booking for activities including football, rugby and rounders. On the fringe of the park can be found Bude allotment site with 74 plots available to rent.

What you told us

We used information from customer feedback surveys, service requests and intelligence from our partners to identify the things that you wanted addressing in the Ward. We then worked with Partners to try to address these priorities.

Partnership working was undertaken with the Police, Fire Service, Youth Service staff, Enforcement Officers and Streetscene teams to progress through meetings such as the Tasking meeting addressing issues in the ward. This provides a local solution to local issues by working together to co-ordinate effective solutions.

Community safety

What we did:

- A multi- agency project took place to deliver reassurance following a spike in deliberate fires and anti- social behaviour in the area 12 different streets was visited
- Ward budget has been used to provide push bikes to the Neighbourhood Policing Team giving greater coverage of the Ward by the PCSO'
- Ward budget has been used to allow 'Prison me no way' to attend primary schools on an education basis
- Ward budget was used to install bollard on Edendale and Dalwood Close to deter unwanted vehicle access
- Used Ward budget to fund a TRO on Littondale to further protect drivers and pedestrians by providing improved vision

Environment

What we did:

- Used Ward budget to install extra bins to cope with the increased use of Bude Park along with others in areas under pressure with litter
- Planted 80 mature trees to enhance the public open spaces
- Volunteer litter picks have been supported by the Neighbourhood Team
- Ward budget has funded a number of reconstruction projects to footpaths across the ward including major resurfacing works most notable on Grandale footpath.
- Removal of overgrown shrubberies
- Delivering regeneration of 479 Council Caspon properties

Cohesion

What we did:

- Working with ReNew we have help focus on alcohol awareness with the development of online resources
- Facilitated the use of Alf Marshall Community Centre as a COVID19 vaccination centre
- Held multi agencies surgeries at various locations around the Ward
- Used Ward budget to support Kingswood United in engaging with young people through football on Bude Park
- Used Ward budget to allow Bodmin Road Church to develop a support program for residents
- Used Ward budget to support Bransholme toddler group develop a bank of toys
- Used Ward budget to support the Neighbourhood Policing Team in delivering Duke of Edinburgh
- Used Ward budget to fund fire dogs attending schools in the Ward on an educational basis

Ward priorities

Investing in infrastructure, housing, highways and the local environment

We will:

- Identify neighbourhood projects in the development of the city's 'Living with Water' approach to flood prevention
- Work with partners to ensure the design of the built environment discourages crime and the fear of crime
- Provide a network of high quality open spaces and natural environments to include a new 'trim trail' on public open space between Sutton Park and Sutton Road
- Support communities to set out and deliver the change they want to see in their neighbourhood
- Continue to plant trees across the ward to enhance the green spaces

Delivering sustained cultural and leisure growth

We will:

- Support physical activity, sport participation and arts audience development in our neighbourhoods
- Develop and promote Bude Park using 106 monies to become a centre of excellence for sports
- Delivery of the 'Active Travel Strategy' at the local level, supporting the cycling and walking culture within our neighbourhoods and reducing our impact on climate change

Creating a healthy, safe and environmentally friendly city

We will:

- Work with Humberside Police and other partners to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour in our communities
- Through the Common Tasking Framework, work with partners to tackle child exploitation, domestic violence, human trafficking and all forms of extremism
- Respond to road safety concerns raised by residents and partners
- Maintain street and area cleanliness exploring new and alternative approaches to improving the environment
- Support and promote the Council's Climate Change Agenda through consultation and engagement events
- Work together to create, sustain and improve an environment that promotes physical and mental well-being across all settings - economic, social and community issues

Improve the health and welfare of our residents

We will:

- Embed a Community Asset Based Approach (Our People, Places and Communities) into health improvement activity and future models of delivery, working with people, their families and communities to build on the support and assets they already have around them to support community resilience
- Develop new ways of working in partnership with the Primary Care Networks to deliver differently in terms of health improvement, well-being and prevention to improve life chances for all by addressing health inequalities through 'a healthier place to live' strategy for Hull
- Support the delivery of campaigns to improve the health and well-being of residents
- Review past Service Level Agreements with Council funded Community Centres, Alf Marshall and St Andrews through the implementation of a Community Use Agreement that promotes maximum usage of the asset for the benefit of the local community whilst supporting the delivery of the Council's Corporate Plan objectives
- Ensure Ward Budget projects demonstrate a positive impact on the targeted community, making neighbourhoods better places to live and work

Provide residents with a voice and influence in shaping their communities

We will:

- Continue to improve public participation in local democracy through area based working, resident and business consultation, access to public meetings and membership of the Youth Parliament (supporting Elected Members in carrying out their Area and Community Leadership roles)
- Explore options via the Youth Networks to provide young people with a voice and involvement in local decision making
- Support community cohesion and integration through the way we engage and provide services.
- Work with our communities to develop and deliver social action projects in their neighbourhoods through the delivery of the Active Citizen learning programme

Ensuring financial and social inclusion

We will:

- Identify local opportunities to provide face-to-face service locally through Outreach, locality and mobile working as well as supporting digital access in venues across the City



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
